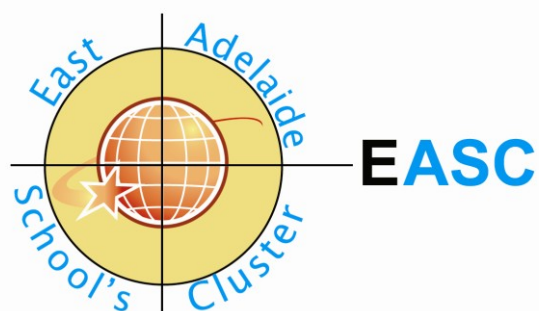

All equipment (cameras, tripods, microphones, lighting, computers and software) is provided by the host school in a purpose built Media Studies studio.
